Critical Time Intervention (CTI): An Instructor-Led Online Course

Course Description

Critical Time Intervention (CTI) is a focused, time-limited approach to case management that is designed to connect people with community supports as they transition into housing from homelessness or institutional settings such as prisons and hospitals. CTI is an evidence-based practice that has been used to support individuals with a serious mental illness, HIV,



or those who have experienced chronic homelessness. CTI is now recognized across the United States and internationally as a cutting-edge case management model. This course will give your agency the tools it needs to implement CTI. We bring together national CTI experts, a team-based learning approach, and engaging multimedia technology. The course covers CTI principles, evidence for CTI, phases of CTI, and skills for implementation.

and state legislation, community-level solutions, and organizational policies in creating positive social change. Melissa holds a BA in Sociology from Gettysburg College and a MSW from Boston University.

Tom Bardwell, MAEd, is a public health professional, artist, and t3 trainer. Tom facilitates training on Critical Time Intervention (CTI), harm reduction, trauma-informed practices, and stigma to improve services for people experiencing homelessness. Tom has worked in various settings including after-school programs, drop-in centers, day-care, and summer camps. From 2007 to 2011, he worked for Youth on Fire, a homeless youth drop-in center in Cambridge, MA, where he implemented anti-oppression workshops and created safe spaces for frontline staff, youth, and members of the community. Tom served on the Massachusetts Commission on Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender Youth. A native Ohioan, Tom moved to Massachusetts in 2004 to complete the Emerson College Master's Program in Theatre Education.
